

Denosa calls out Health Dept

THE Democratic Nursing Organisation of South Africa (Denosa) Student Movement Limpopo has called the MEC for Health's call for nursing students to assist at vaccination sites as 'exploitation at its best'.

Final-year nursing students at the University of Limpopo (UL) were recently given training on the vaccination process by Health MEC Dr Phophi Ramathuba before the opening of a secondary vaccination site at UL on July 18.

Denosa Student Movement Limpopo acting chairperson Rebotile Maphuthuma told **BONUS** that while they understand the need for mass vaccinations and welcome the intiative by the health department, they believe the department should instead consider appointing post community service nurses and use them as vaccinators instead. He added that the hours given to the students were not stipulated by the South African Nursing Council and that students were given more hours than current employed nurses.

The department should not use this as an excuse for students to learn how to inject because they already know how to do this.

"Those nurses are already working overtime as vaccinators, so we cannot let our students work for those long and unaccepted hours as students, let alone not even be compensated for their work. It it is highly unfair towards them. The students should be in a clinical field learning all the clinical skills, not vaccinating," he

Maphuthuma added that the students already know how to conduct intramuscular injections, having mastered the skill by their fourth year of study and the only training they would need to receive was orientation on the handling of the vaccine. "The department should not use this initiative as an excuse for the students to learn how to inject because they already know how to do so as part of their qualification and practicals," he said.

The students were called up as part of government's plan to expand the pool of qualified vaccinators who will join the current team in fasttracking the nationwide vaccination programme.

"We called on final-year nursing students to assist with the vaccination programme as they are almost done with their studies. As the vaccination programme gains momentum, we will need more manpower to be equal to the task as we will open more sites. All our clinics will become vaccination sites, so these students will come in handy to ease the burden of our healthcare professionals who are currently responding to those who are sick and warrant admissions," Ramathuba said at the time of

She encouraged and urged all eligible age groups to register to be vaccinated.

Learners can still collect meals

LEARNERS who receive meals via the National School Nutrition Programme will still be allowed to collect meals from school despite classes being on a rotational basis.

Department of Education spokesperson, Tidimalo Chuene says schools have to provide meals for learners every day, including those who come to school on a rotational basis and that learners who are not attending class on a particular day are allowed to receive their meals.

Learners returned to class on Monday after being closed for a month due to adjusted level four lockdown restrictions.

"We were happy to welcome learners back for the third term. The return of all primary school learners for daily attendance is planned for Monday August 2 as Ramaphosa has stated," she

Chuene further explained that the education sector is still on full alert and will continue to apply standard operating procedures for the prevention and management of Covid-19 in schools. This includes ensuring wearing of masks, daily screening, sanitising of hands and frequently touched surfaces, and social distancing.

"Unauthorised, non-academic visits to schools will be prohibited based on the current

Covid-19 risk adjusted strategy level and the need for schools to strictly focus on catching up on lost teaching and learning time," she said.

Chuene also confirmed that the learner transport programme will also continue to ferry learners from pick up points in accordance to the route arrangements.

Education MEC Polly Boshielo and senior management of the department monitored the reopening of schools this week, to assess the settling in of learners and assist in areas where there might be challenges. "We have a mammoth task ahead of us in terms of catching up on lost time, at the same time navigating through challenges presented by Covid-19. However, I'm confident that we will have a productive third term," Boshielo said.

Chuene further said parents and guardians were reminded that the closing dates for the process of registering learners for admission in public schools in Limpopo for the 2022 academic year are approaching.

"Walk-in registration at schools for children who will be going to school for the first time or moving to a new school next year will be closing on July 30. Online registration at schools participating in the online learner admission pilot project will close on August 6.

A notice will be published in the Provincial Gazette and media to inform the public of the adopted Polokwane Land Use Scheme.

LJBI gives jewellery students the edge

IN its 12 years of existance, over 144 students have completed their jewellery design and manufacturing qualification with the Limpopo Jewellery Business Incubator

The non-profit organisation, whose main incubation centre is in the Seshego Industrial Park, was established by the Limpopo Department of Economic Development, Environment and Tourism (LEDET) and the Small Enterprise Development Agency (Seda) and was funded by the European Union (EU).

It was established to contribute to creating economic opportunities through developing and supporting emerging jewellery businesses from historically disadvantaged



LJBI centre manager Tessa Ngobeni told BONUS that LJBI is fully accredited by the mining qualification authority to offer training to previously disadvantaged individuals. The centre also received full accreditation with Quality Council for Trades and Occupations (QCTO) to offer a trade qualification (goldsmith).

As the centre manager, Tessa manages and oversees the centre's day-to-day operation. "I ensure that all programmes are executed successfully according to our agreement with funders and that all reports to funders and board of directors are compiled correctly and submitted on time.

Tessa says 18 Small, Medium and Micro Enterprises (SMMEs) students graduated from the incubation programme, while a few others were sent to China and Italy for jewellery skills training. After graduating, students are able to start their own businesses. "Some students are employed within the industry, while others have started their own businesses already. They also receive support and mentoring on how to run their businesses," she said.

Tessa said LJBI is the official sponsor and manufacturer of Marothi and Rachel's wedding rings from Skeem Saam.

Those interested in joining or applying to study at LJBI must be a South African citizen, between the ages of ages of 18 and 35, have completed and passed Gr 10 or Gr 12 and have the ability and passion to work with their hands.

'Exercise is key to success'

EXERCISE is important in increasing your performance and preventing injuries according to Hlole Magahlela.

The Ga-Molepo born former netball player is currently an accredited level 1 coach and umpire.

Hlole spoke to **BONUS** about the importance of exercise, as well as about the sport in general.

"If you would like to pursue netball as a career, you need to remember that the sport is played at high intensities with many accelerations, decelerations, changes of direction, jumping and landings throughout the game. No matter what position you play on the court, you need to be able to jump, catch the ball and often land on one leg before passing the ball," she said.

Hlole said her role as a coach is to keep young players safe and to create a positive netball environment that allows players to develop within the sport.

"I provide feedback on players" performances, physical and technical skills. I also develop and discuss tactics and strategies for both individual and team play," she added.

As an umpire, Hlole has to work extra hard as they have to observe the game's rules, award points, impose penalties, examine participants to make sure they follow safety regulations, and determine

She added that exercises are important to prepare yourself for upcoming matches and tournaments.

'Common injuries that usually occur during court performances are to the knees and ankles as a result of a poor landing technique, whether due to contact or not. To decrease or avoid getting injured while

playing, you have to exercise regularly," she

Hlole advises players to exercise at least twice a week as she believes this will play a role in increasing your court performance.

"Exercising will improve your ability to land and balance on one leg properly, as well as increase your strength in the contest," Hlole concluded.

Preparation exercises to do at home: Glute bridge:

- Lie on your back, put your feet shoulder width apart with your arms lying flat on the sides (heels close to your fingertips).
- Lift your hips towards the sky in an up and down motion.
- Squeeze your bottom at the top position and hold for two seconds.
- Do three sets of 15 reps.

Single leg squat:

- Find a step or staircase where you can place one foot on a step, and the other foot on a lower step.
- Make sure that your knee is in the same level as your other foot as you squat - do not let your knee drop inwards.
- Control your movement down until the opposite leg touches the ground.
- Do three sets of 15 reps on each leg.

Jab for jab with local boxing icon

THE former South African supreme light heavyweight boxing champion, James 'Dynamite' Mathato believes he can still take any boxer on.

The 86-year-old sportsman from Seshego started boxing in 1967 and competed in 21 amateur fights and 22 professional fights before retiring in August 1981. He was introduced to the sport while working in the then Transvaal province.

"I worked at a company called AECI Limited in the North Rand Transvaal where I worked for most of my life. We lived in hostels and one day I picked up a boxing glove while walking to work and took it straight to our factory manager and told him I would like to learn more about the sport. I had seen boxers practicing in the sport complex hall within our work premises and found it intriguing," he said.

The factory manager introduced James to the coach and the rest was history. "It was the happiest day of my life. I was motivated by the professional boxers I saw on television. This was a very big opportunity for me to show off my boxing skills," he said.

James became an amateur champion in 1969 and a professional champion in 1972. He told BONUS that he was in the first multi-racial boxing match in South Africa against world heavyweight champion, Gerhardus Christian 'Gerrie' Coetzee, who held a World Boxing Association (WBA) title. He also fought in the first ever multi-racial boxing match in Gqeberha against Kosie Smith, who became the supreme light heavyweight champion of South Africa after knocking James

out in the fifth round. James did not give up and kept on fighting in national matches. James now owns a boxing club where he coaches three professional boxers, including local boxer, Molepo Kgasago, and gives classes to boxers in the Seshego area. "I know all the rules, skills and techniques within the sport so I decided to pass my knowledge on to the children in my community. I believe boxing improves balance and posture, and strengthens the upper-body and

core. Boxing practice boosts the boxers' endurance, increases their alertness and also improves their hand-eye coordination," he said.

"As old as I am, I will still challenge anyone in the boxing ring. I believe icons like myself should be honoured and people should host tributes for us while we're still alive," James said.

He added that his one wish is to meet President Cyril Ramaphosa and the Limpopo Premier, Chupu
